Safeguarding & Health News

Vomiting and Diarrhoea: Many of you are aware that we have had many children off school this week suffering from a sickness bug. We keep in close contact with the local doctors' surgery and as stated in our First Aid and Medical Policy (March 2018) (available on school website), "if a child vomits or has diarrhoea in school, they will be sent home immediately. Children with these conditions

after the <u>last</u> symptom has elapsed".

As stated by Public Health England, diarrhoea and vomiting can have many different causes (including medical conditions, side effects of medications, excessive sun etc) but the cause will be assumed to be an infection until known otherwise. An infection in the gut causing diarrhoea and vomiting (gastroenteritis) can be easily passed to others. Anyone with gastroenteritis should be regarded as very infectious and must be kept away from school until the diarrhoea and vomiting has stopped and they have been passing normal stools for at least 48 hours. We would ask all our parents/carers to follow this advice and support our staff in encouraging basic hygiene measures (eg hand washing). Thank you.
