Disco: The School Council have finalised the disco details (see the poster on page 4). We will be a holding school disco on Thursday 8 February. The theme is 'red' but this is optional. We ask that age appropriate clothing is worn for a primary school disco, particularly in KS2.

The first disco will be from 17:00-17:45 for Years R, 1 and 2. A parent or carer will need to accompany Reception and Year 1 children. The KS2 disco will be from 18:00-19:00.

Entry will be £2 on the gate; please bring the exact amount. We encourage water bottles to be brought along. There will be a tuck shop selling sweets, crisps and squash. We will also have a tattoo booth. Children must not bring more than £4 into the disco please.

Safeguarding: "What to do if you think your child has measles and when to keep them off school?" has just been published on The Education Hub blog.

Cases of measles are rising across England, including among children. It's an infection that spreads very easily and for some people can cause serious problems. There's no specific medical treatment for measles, so it's important to get vaccinated as it's the best protection against becoming seriously unwell. The measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine is one of the routine childhood vaccinations, so most children are already vaccinated against measles. If your child has received both doses of the vaccine, they are unlikely to have the virus. Question on the gate: "Why aren't the children in school next Friday?"

"We have our annual Curriculum Review INSET day on Friday. Children can't come into school as the Teachers and HLTAs meet together to review and suggest improvements for the HEPS 2024-25 curriculum. Subject Leaders listen to the recommendations of their colleagues and the opinions of the children before amending the curriculum. All children participate in pupil voice groups which are undertaken by the Subject Leader throughout the year.

Although February may seem early to consider next year's curriculum, we need time to plan staffing, timetables and buy resources suitable for any new content. We may also need to plan training opportunities, arrange visits/visitors or research new topics.

The curriculum is complex and takes a considerable amount of time to plot in order that each topic shows progression across the year groups and is placed at the correct point to develop complimentary skills in other subjects or areas. Whilst the curriculum review is demanding, it's one of the most important pieces of work we undertake as it leads to incredible experiences, learning opportunities and life-long skills which place our children in the best possible position to be successful in life beyond HEPS."

Wet weather drop off - for the first time - having a teacher / staff member they knew at the gate so they saw a familiar face.

Extremely impressed so far with the set-up, polite and friendly ethos, child's progress, presentation assembly, fun disco. Thank you. Actions from survey results:

- Although we contacted parents by email as soon as we received the Reception confirmed list, we will be contacting parents with a follow up phone call too from this year to explain the process and when they will be contacted again. This way, parents can ask questions rather than just receive information from us.
- Information about the change for a wet weather drop off will be included in the welcome pack and explained at the open evening for Reception parents.
- For parents with a child on the waiting list, we will contact them termly to confirm the position even if this is 'no change'.
- The manual ordering of food, booking clubs and childcare is always offered before children start as this can't be actioned before the first day due to the children not being enrolled. This is a national process and can't be changed. This will be communicated with more clarity.
- We are including an example page in the planner from September 2024 which will show how we expect the planner to be typically completed.
- We will include a glossary in planners and the Reception pack with terms such as mufti, INSET, sparkle jar, coloured houses etc.
